Mark Dorr- US Department Senior English Language, ESP Fellow, USA English and STEM: Improving Learner Outcomes with EMI/CLIL

How does a teacher or administrator actually turn the idea of improving learning outcomes into reality? How can teaching STEM through English be something tangible and achievable...perhaps even enjoyable? This presentation discusses the general concepts of Learner Outcomes, English as the Medium of Instruction (EMI) and Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL) as they relate to STEM education. It reviews basic models in use internationally as well as some of the successes and challenges programs have encountered. The goal of the session is to provide educators with not only the background to begin exploring these concepts but also ready-made techniques that are applicable easily and quickly. In conclusion, by first considering what the goals actually are, reviewing general models, and providing procedures and tools to begin achieving those goals, this discussion enables participants to improve learner outcomes and enrich their school or university programs.

'Teaching EFL to Kazakhstani University Students: Challenges and Solutions'

In recent years Kazakhstani foreign language education is undergoing drastic changes to follow the state policy on the tri-unity of Kazakh, Russian and English languages on the one hand, and the internationalization of the national educational system as a whole on the other. There are many challenges accompanying the process of change in the higher education of the country. They can be grouped into three general areas: (1) university EFL program per se: its objectives, content and administration, (2) students and learning, and (3) EFL teachers and teaching.

This paper will deal with the most common challenges and suggest possible solutions. The major focus will be on such issues as:

- What are the role, place and importance of an EFL program in a university curricula and teaching? Are there enough resources for efficient teaching and learning, and is there enough support on behalf of the university administration?
- Are we aware of our students' needs and demands? Do the EFL competences students possess upon graduation provide them a competitive advantage in the modern labor market?
- Are we enough motivated to be in a teaching profession? What are our strengths and weaknesses? How can we further our professional development?
- Do all three levels of EFL education (primary, secondary and tertiary) interact and cooperate to produce joint result? What should be done to combine EFL teacher community efforts in achieving a higher level of student EFL proficiency nationwide?

Our goal as educators is to take the materials that we have, and use them in such a way that maximizes the benefits for our learners. The goal of this workshop is to introduce activities that take the role of the student from passive to active. For example, "listen and do" activities using lyrical music are a great way to assess student listening comprehension, while introducing meaningful and engaging input. This workshop will explore a range of listening comprehension activities which aim to demand more from the student, requiring them to truly demonstrate their comprehension. We will also explore expansion and alternatives to fit the needs of a variety of different learners.



Yelena Mikheyeva – English FL Teacher, Educational Centre "LinguaTown", Semey. *Using simple techniques to enhance young learners' oral and writing discourse*

I would like to share the strategy I have been successfully using in my primary learners' classes to help children not only to express children thoughts but to create a narrative and put the actions in a logical order. The focus of this poster is on the steps displayed on the classroom wall as reference or a guide at work that help children to create their stories and make it with enthusiasm and creativity and a sense of competition. These techniques are quite successful with children and encouraged young learners to continue the writing task based on the oral discourse produced in relation to the pictures and the stories.

Learning activities, experiences, assessments, interpretive challenges, lessons learned, and recommendations for future development are presented with the aim of eventually developing "best practices" for the teaching and learning of technical specialty subject-matter in English in Kazakhstan.
